Romans: Good News for All!

Our next Wednesday evening Bible Study will begin on July 19th at 6:00 pm in Schell Hall. For this study we will be looking at the New Testament Book of Romans. This study will explore how the gospel was proclaimed in the early church and how this makes a difference in our understanding of Good News for us and for others!

Whether you realize it or not, the Book of Romans has a special place in United Methodist history. In order to introduce Romans, we will have a "sign up" night for the Bible Study on Wednesday, May 24th at 6:00 pm in the Sanctuary. For this sign-up time we will celebrate Aldersgate Day by hearing a reading of Luther's Preface to the Book of Romans.

Aldersgate Day is celebrated on May 24 (or the Sunday closest) to commemorate the day in 1738 when John Wesley experienced assurance of his salvation. Wesley reluctantly attended a group meeting that evening on Aldersgate Street in London. As he heard a reading

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from Luther's Preface to the Epistle to the Romans, he felt his "heart strangely warmed." Wesley wrote in his journal that at about 8:45 p.m. "while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

Charles Wesley only a few days before had also had a conversion experience in the same place. The building where the meetings took place no longer exists. Aldersgate Street has been shortened by common Methodist usage to simply Aldersgate. The word has come to represent both the place and the experience. Come and join this new Bible study being prepared by Pastor Scott for our congregation.

Come and hear why the Gospel truly is Good News for All!

NOT QUITE HOME

Thoughts from Pastor Scott

There are many things about the early church that are <u>not</u> to be admired. Even a casual reading of James, either or the Corinthian letters or Galatians will show you that the early Christians had their struggles.

We often think of the Book of Acts as being a "history" book on the early church. To a point, that is quite true. However, the book of Acts tells us the early Christian view of how the movement that formed around the death and resurrection of Jesus as they looked back on those events. It was not a newspaper account but more of a reflection some years after the events. The book also shows us some of the things that were apparently valued early on by Christians. Perhaps if we were to think about it in our terms, they talked about "the good ole days." Take for instance Acts 2:42-46:

"The believers devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching, to the community, to their shared meals, and to their prayers. A sense of awe came over everyone. God performed many wonders and signs through the apostles. All the believers were united and shared everything. They would sell pieces of property and possessions and distribute the proceeds to everyone who needed them. Every day, they met together in the temple and ate in their homes. They shared food with gladness and simplicity." (Emphasis added)

There are many things in this passage a pastor could choose to speak about. Signs and wonders, sharing meals, sharing "everything"...are just a few of the wondrous things that the early Christians looked back upon with fondness. But the one that caught my eye is the very one that I think many of us look back on in fondness even to this day – "every day, they met together." Of course, for us a reflection back on the good ole days would say, "every week, they met together."

Something has fundamentally changed in our culture and in our churches. At one time we highly valued attendance each and every week with the congregation of our membership. But that is no longer the case. Now, we are not surprised when people are in worship once a month or even less. Now, we take it for granted that people will not always be in worship and we look back fondly on the days when the pews were filled every week because everybody was there.

Strangely, we still use the same membership vows we did decades ago: "We covenant faithfully to participate in the ministries of the church by our prayers, our presence, our gifts and our service." Is it time to petition General Conference to add "whenever possible" after the word presence?

Now, I realize that some people are going to take this little article the wrong way. They are going to see it as the "preacher giving people a hard time about being in church." Those who attend every week will applaud. Those who don't will wonder who exactly I am thinking about. Well, I am not, I repeat, I am not thinking of any one in particular. I am pointing out a trend about church attendance that is quite scary to me. It's scary to me because it means that the "whole team" is not here all the time. If a sports team attempted to practice or play with only 60% of their team each week, they would have to forfeit most games. (Not to mention that coaches just would not allow this lack of commitment.) If a television show attempted to use just 60% of their characters each episode, because everyone couldn't show up for the filming, well, their stories would never be told.

Our current trends in church attendance scare me because I think that when you lower the bar of expectations for members, people will have a tendency to meet that expectation. When you raise it, well, they will do everything in their power to meet those as well.

However, I refuse to give in to fear and instead have hope! Hope that comes from serving the resurrected Savior! Five years from now, I would like to look back and say, "Wow...remember when we only needed one service for everybody to attend? Remember when it wasn't so crowded? Remember when some people didn't have to stand during the last service of the day?"

Yeah...that's what I want to look back and say...

First United Methodist Church's 30 for 70 is an annual event where participants raise awareness and funds for the Feeding the Hungry Children Ministry. The participants began fasting around 1 PM on Friday, March 31st. The event began at the church at 5:30 PM, and the fast ended at 7 PM on Saturday, April 1st with Holy Communion.

Throughout the weekend, participants are grouped into teams. They play games, compete in a scavenger hunt, raise money for Feeding Hungry Children and collect canned food and clothing items for



Bluefield Union Mission. On Saturday, the competition pauses for the teams to focus on local mission projects. Each team volunteered at Bluefield Union Mission, packaged weekend bags for FHC, and delivered lunch to one of our church's homebound members.

This weekend is the perfect mixture of fun and service. All who participated learned a great deal about our community and how we can help combat hunger in Mercer County. We were also able to fellowship with one another and grow closer to God through Bible study and service.

This year, we had 5 teams made up of youth and adults (25 participants). They collected over 1,200 canned food items and over 1,000 pieces of clothing for Bluefield Union Mission, and \$2,645 for the Feeding the Hungry Children Ministry. After sharing about the weekend during Sunday's service, we had several other church members donate and pushed the total dollar amount raised to \$3,000! In 2015 the group raised \$1,100 and in 2016 the total raised was \$1,500.

I pray that this trend continues! While this began as a youth event, my hope is that teams representing the entire congregation join us in the future. If you would like more details on how you can be involved please let us know.


