The Gospel of Mark – First Among the Synoptics September 26 - November 14, 2018



The Wednesday evening Discipleship Study will focus on the Gospel of Mark starting Wednesday, September 26, and running through November 14. We begin at 6:00 pm and end at 7:30 pm.

This particular study will look at the whole Gospel, find ways to relate different portions of the Gospel to our everyday lives, and also offer help to people who might want to lead discussions on the Gospel in other small group settings. No special book is required for this study – just show up!! (Pastor Scott does want you to know that the class will be reading the entire Gospel EACH week between meetings.)

Welcome To Our New Director of Music Ministries

In August, we welcomed Dr. Kipp Cortez as our new Director of Music Ministries. Kipp is originally from Chicago, IL. He is currently the Joseph F. Marsh Endowed Assistant Professor of Music at Concord University and Adjust Instructor of Carillon at Hollins University. Kipp received his B. Mus from Valparaiso University and his M. Mus and DMA in Organ and Sacred Music from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. Previously, Kipp served in



music ministry at multiple churches in Michigan. He was featured most recently as a recitalist at the Washington National Cathedral in DC.



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Pastor Scott on 1 Corinthians 13:13 and how Paul was reminding the Corinthians what was necessary for a church to survive.

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Now faith, hope, and love remain – these three things – and the greatest of these is love. 1 Corinthians 13:13

These words are probably quoted more at weddings than any other time in a Christian worship setting. I know that I have used them a countless number of times myself in that setting. Despite the fact that the "love chapter" of 1 Corinthians sounds so appropriate for the

celebration of love, covenant, and commitment that a wedding is, these words were not originally written for couples.

The original context of these words, this wonderful reminder of the power of faith, hope, and love - especially love - was one where Paul was encouraging the church to really be the church in their time. They had fallen victim squabbles over whose to teaching was the greatest and disagreements had allowed among families to seep into the life of the church family.

Paul set out in this letter to remind them of the things that were absolutely necessary for a church to survive.

First there is faith. Seems rather

obvious that a group of people who come together in belief about a resurrected Savior would need "faith" but from time to time we all need reminders. It is very easy to think that the church is something of a human construction. We work together, give together, and worship together as human beings, so it would only be natural to think that human effort could bring about all that is necessary for the church to be the church. Nothing could be further from the truth. It takes faith and lots of it for the church to survive.

It takes faith that God is working in the lives of those we call brothers and sisters to allow them to use their gifts to do the work of God. It takes faith in leaders who are diligently striving to discern the will and way of God for our time and place. And it takes a great amount of personal faith in God to give abundantly to the church and allow

> those gifts to be used by God to do the work of the church in the community and the world.

> Some people think that the opposite of faith is "faithlessness" but really the opposite of faith is control. Whenever we strive to take control so things will turn out "our way" we are really showing a lack of faith. Paul reminds us to have faith.

> Second there is hope. If there is ever anything that is needed to keep the Good News spreading throughout the world, it is hope. The first century world into which Paul originally launched this epistle is really not that different than the world in which we live. People died, tragedy could strike, and folks struggled from day to day just to make their lives work. Our world, especially the world of Southern West Virginia, where jobs

seem scarce, where substance use disorder seems to be king, and where even little children die, is a world that desperately needs hope.

As people of the Resurrection, we hold the greatest hope of all. Death is defeated! There is NOTHING to fear in this world. And we can begin living as people who know eternal life right now. No matter what we as a community or a

church face, we should always be a people of hope.

Last but not least Paul reminds them of the greatest thing that remains – love.

Every once in a while I will hear from someone that there has to be more to the Christian faith than just "love". It just makes it all seem so soft. There's no bite to love, no requirements to love and it just seems to make grace cheap if all we have to do is love.

Well, let's remember the basis of love and the example of love that we have been given by God: "For God so loved the world, he gave his son – his only son – so that whoever believes in him would know the gift of eternal life." (My translation...)

The love that we share with one another, and the love that we share to the world is not easy. It is not cheap. It is not soft at all. It is a love that is willing to put our most cherished possessions, most cherished relationships, and our most cherished thoughts on the cross in order to show others the gift we have been given.

Paul says..." the greatest of these is love".

And nothing could be truer, my brothers and sisters.

It is God's love that allows us to have faith and hope. It is our love for one another and for everyone else in this world that will outlast anything we strive to do with our own minds, words, or hands. The greatest power in the world is, without question, love.

Faith. Hope. Love.

May God continue to bless us all with all three of these. But may our hearts and lives run over with an abundance of love.

Adult Classes

Some class members also take turns leading lessons based on DVD studies or books. Discussion is also a big part of this group's meetings.
