#### Pastor Tom's Tidbit

It's been a while since I've had the opportunity to share my thoughts with you. No one could ever have imagined what we would face beginning March 2020. It has been very different since the pandemic and as we continue the slow return to a more normal routine, I pray that all is well with you.

In talking with pastoral colleagues, there is consensus on one conclusion. We have all had to learn to be even more creative and learn new techniques to communicate the Gospel of Jesus to a broader audience. It was very challenging to preach to an empty sanctuary, being intentional to communicate clearly and meaningfully, and to consider that our worshipping congregation was dealing with different emotions and apprehensions in the unprecedented time.

Now that we are closing in on a year of physical distancing, wearing masks, and carefully cleaning and sanitizing surfaces, we have learned that our ministry efforts have to evolve so that we can share a message of hope and encouragement in a "hybrid" way! What do I mean by hybrid? We are reaching people with our livestream and radio broadcasts that otherwise did not have access to a worship experience with churches being closed to in-person worship.

We are reaching people in North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, Virginia, Maine, New Jersey, and Ohio. People are connecting with us and we have become difference makers for God's kingdom in a time when people are feeling very vulnerable. As we return to in-person worship and weekly program events, we want to continue to reach out to people who make the choice to continue to worship from their homes. I certainly respect the decision to be as safe as possible and if someone feels more comfortable worshipping with the online option I encourage you to do so.

As we move toward the lofty goal of every person being vaccinated, let's make sure that we continue our efforts to provide options for people in this time of transition! We are slowly making our way toward that time when the majority of our people will feel more comfortable about returning to familiar routines.

Will there be things we continue to do to provide a safe and clean environment? Absolutely!! We will not deviate from the practices we know are working and helping reduce the number of potential exposures. This has been a learning process for all of us and there are other lessons to come. Let's stay diligent in doing what we know is working!

As I bring my remarks to a close, please know that I love the good people of First UMC, Princeton and look forward to seeing you face to face. I long for that time when we can gather around the table of our Lord and share in the sacrament of communion. It will happen in due time. Just stay focused on the love of Jesus and help us continue to be difference-makers in this community and throughout the world as we make disciples of Jesus for the transformation of this world.

Hello church family!

The youth group has been doing a lot of great things since our last Remarker. The year of 2020 going into 2021 was very unprecedented and we weren't provided with a playbook of how to continue youth ministries during this time. We had to be creative, think outside the box, learn virtual teaching tools, and how we could safely do some activities in person. It was difficult to try to stay in touch with our families and to help our students continue to build a relationship with each other and to grow closer to God. But, I think we did things safely and creatively to where we were able to stay connected to our students and families.

During the fall semester we started out with in-person Bible study based off of the student's school schedule and we went to virtual if our county was orange or red.

BJ and I went to the hospital after our very first in-person Bible Study and Milo was born on Thursday night. As many of you know, we then had to go to Roanoke and Milo spent 24 days in the NICU due to heath issues and complications due to his Down syndrome that we were totally surprised by! But, during that time of living in a hotel, going to laundromats, and spending days in the hospital all of our wonderful church family and friends gave us strength and encouragement! We cannot thank every enough for their prayers, kind words, support, and gifts of flowers, food and covering our hotel room. Also, our youth program continued on thanks to Wes McKinney and Corey Mann. I was able to prep some lessons in the hotel room to help them keep the Bible Study going while I was away. So, a huge **THANK YOU** to them both!

In the fall, our youth program didn't skip a beat even in my absence thanks to Corey and Wes. I was able to get back in town to have our October game night – Murder Mystery Dinner. We then had virtual Bible Study for the rest of the semester as the cases of COVID increased due to the holidays. In November, we were unable to attend our WV Conference's Fall Workshop in Ripley. Instead, the conference recorded some music, lessons, student led worship and activities and we had a drive-in Fall Workshop that students and their families could attend while listening to the videos on a FM radio broadcast. In December, we had our annual Christmas party at the Bluefield AMC movie theater. We rented out a theater so we could spread out and enjoy a Christmas classic – Elf. We took a short break around the Christmas and New Year holidays and we resumed near mid-January when the students resumed school.

In January and February, we have been able to have in-person Bible study. We were unable to take our annual trip to Pigeon Forge to attend Resurrection. Instead, we were able to distance in our gym and watch a live-steam that the Holston Conference put on for a one night only event. In February our monthly event was snow tubing at Winterplace. We also had a "Valentine Sweet Treat Tray" Fundraiser for our Higher Education Grant Fund. A church family member was able to purchase a treat tray and have it delivered to another church family member. Most everyone chose to order one for a homebound church member and we were able to deliver the trays with Vickie's Letters of Love. In March we will continue our Bible study on Wednesday evenings from 6 to 7:30 PM and on Sunday from 4 to 5:30 PM. We will try to have our annual 30 for 70 fast on the last weekend of March. Our students fast, raise funds, collect ministry items and learn about and raise awareness of the hunger problem that we have right here in Princeton, Mercer County. 100% of the funds we raise will go towards our Feeding Hungry Children ministry, and we will collect items to help our other local ministries. Our fast will look different than in years past, as I try to be creative and think about how we can do so safely, respecting COVID protocols.

Also in March, we will have our annual St. Patrick's Day Dinner for our Higher Education Grant Fund. This fundraiser helps our youth, those who participate, when they graduate they receive a one-time check for all the fundraisers based off of their involvement in the youth program and the ministries in the life of the church. This dinner will be a little different as we will ask to "pre-order" the number of meals they want. We will have pick-up, drive thru, and possibly deliver options! So, please support our students and "pre-order" a couple of meals for your Sunday dinner on March 14<sup>th</sup>! Pick up will be right after church as that is when it is normally served. All of the meals are donation only, but we do ask that you consider donating what you normally would spend on your Sunday dinner.

Hello church family!

As many of you know, before the fall semester I was beyond blessed to become the Director of Youth and Children's Ministries. I wanted to take the Children's Ministry and build on the foundation that Barb Ballard had established. I am taking this new responsibility the same way I did when I became the Youth Director, not making any major changes but following the same schedule for the first year, getting feedback from our parents, and if we need to make adjustments, do so over time and slowly. I have a passion for teaching the Bible, helping our young people understand the Bible, and building a fun and safe environment that helps them build relationships with each other and grow closer to God.

The fall semester was mostly virtual and distanced Bible Study. I was unable to be there the first couple of weeks as I was in Roanoke, but Stephanie Bowling and Amanda Wenisch were a huge help! They covered for me and kept our Bible Study going while I was in Roanoke. I cannot thank those two enough for allowing me to have that time with my family!

In the fall, we studied 2 different series: Blast Off and Breaking News. Blast Off was a 4 week series that covered the 4 major spiritual habits that are the foundation of our curriculum – To help them grow spiritually by: spending time with God, spending time with others, using their gifts and sharing their story. Breaking News covered the Prophets which led us into the Christmas season.

At the beginning of the school year we were able to have a backpack give away. We gave out about 30 backpacks to the community at the fountain and then I dropped off the rest at Bluefield Union Mission as they were in need of more school resources. We also were able to have a Trunk-or-Treat for our church families. We had a great turn out and I think it was much needed for our kids and their families. Despite doing Bible study virtually, we were still able to have everything that our children's ministry typically would have other than our children's choir and hand chime choir.

We resumed Bible Study on Wednesday evenings around Mid-January. We have had a great turn out and have seen 20 different children attend with our largest group being 18 total. We have been distancing and providing a safe place for our kids to come to build relationships and learn more about Christ. We are currently about to wrap up our series Subscribe Now. In the Bible stories we learned that we can know God through Jesus, we can know forgiveness because of Jesus, Jesus knows us and wants us to follow Him. The next series will be Blueprints where we will look at God's plans.

Our children will have an end of the semester event – Scavenger Hunt on Saturday, March 20<sup>th</sup> at 2 PM. The last Bible Study will be on Wednesday, March 24<sup>th</sup>. We currently have plans to have our annual Easter Egg Hunt on Saturday, April 3<sup>rd</sup>. Then our Children's Bible Study will take a break for the summer.

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#### Feeding Hungry Children Update

As with so many things, the COVID Pandemic put this ministry on hold last March when in-person school was shut down for the remainder of the semester. We were happy to be able to donate our remaining food through Board of Education member, Jacinda Santon-Smith who organized food deliveries to students countywide. We have been blessed to be able to provide food for most of this year's fall semester with the exception of a brief period when the level of Mercer County COVID cases shut down schools for a few weeks. The process has definitely been different as we attempted to honor protocols such as masks and social distancing by packaging one week at a time with no more than two or three team members working at any given time. The Board of Education recently received a onetime special grant which allowed them to provide 2 shipments of food for our program. We were recently able to package 4 weeks' worth of food in the FMC gym, spreading tables beyond 6 feet. We are currently serving 146 students in 4 Princeton area schools, a number that fluctuates frequently. It was a delight to see even a small group of our team members together again! We want to send a huge thanks to God for upholding this ministry and to our church family for support and continued prayers.
