What is Jumpstart?

Jumpstart is a worship experience being offered in the Family Ministries Center once a month by our Young Adults Sunday School Class and others. Worship will include a service of "Imposition of Ashes" where the pastor places ashes in the shape of a cross on the foreheads of those who so desire to receive it. This mark is a reminder to the person wearing it that because we are people of the Cross we understand that God will make something new of our lives. (And no, just because it's Valentine's Day, Pastor Scott will NOT be making "heart signs" on your foreheads!)

NOT QUITE HOME

Thoughts from Pastor Scott

In the decade before I was born – the 1950's – it was assumed that if a person moved into a town like Princeton and found gainful employment, someone in their circle of friends or co-workers would bring that person to church with them. These persons, the ones doing the inviting, were trained, developed and deployed as disciples in their community.

Today we cannot make the above assumption.

First of all, we live in a culture that has begun to idolize the idea that a person has the right to be left alone when it comes to religion. Don't get me wrong, here. I do not believe for a moment that we should live in a place where you don't have religious freedom – even if the dominant religion were to be Christianity. Forced Christianity is an oxymoron. However, what we have become is a culture that values people who keep their mouths shut about their religious beliefs. I do not believe a person should be bullied into going to church. Nor do I think anyone should be subjected to hearing about religion when they don't want to hear about it. (In other words, if someone tells you they are not interested, take a hint and don't be a bother.) However, what this has created is a "reluctance" among Christians to talk about their faith AND we have lost the skill set of doing so without being seen as religious nuts. (There are many other cultural changes that have had some effect on making disciples, but this is one of the main ones. People don't want to BE disciples and that is perfectly accepted in the church.)

Secondly, we have given up on making disciples and instead just worry about "getting members." Even those people who bemoan the falling membership among mainline denominations such as the United Methodist Church complain about just that – membership. We do not even worry about making disciples as long as our attendance and offerings are headed in the right direction.

Last November, I challenged our Church Council with these changes in church culture and invited them to allow us to create a team of people who would look at our current system of "disciple making" and explore what needs to be done in our particular setting to make more disciples of Jesus for the transformation of our world. An invitation to join this group was offered both at the Council meeting and during worship at First UMC, Princeton. Several people have answered the call.

This group will begin meeting on January 14. They are committing to meeting 2½ hours every other Sunday until we come up with a workable plan and the implementation of that plan to develop disciples at First UMC, Princeton, rather than just settle for members.

I am telling you about this for two reasons. First and foremost, be in prayer for this group. They have a heavy burden to carry for all of us. Secondly, pray for the church as it goes through this transition. Many people would like to think that the greatest crisis facing our denomination today is our infighting about certain social issues. *Nothing could be further from the truth.* Should we make a move (back) toward a disciple-making church, membership will suddenly be less about “what I deserve to get from MY church” to “what I need to do in order to be considered a disciple.”

That will make far more people uncomfortable than any discussion about any social issue. So, don't just pray for the group, pray for us all.

Recently, I saw a commercial for the YMCA that basically claimed that as long as a community had a “Y” in their midst, it was the greatest hope for unity in that community. I couldn't believe my eyes when I saw that. The greatest hope this world has is in the power that Jesus gives us through his life, death, and resurrection. Making disciples of Jesus will change our community in powerful ways, and I could not be more excited about this group and the work they will lead us all to do.



TLC has been busy as usual. We completed our quota needed for hat and scarf sets for Feeding Hungry Children. We are making hats now for the Veterans.

Our newest project, woven mats made of plastic trash bags, has just completed their first delivery. Six mats were delivered to the homeless. This is a great way to repurpose plastic bags to make mats that help the homeless as they sleep on the cold ground. We could use more weavers and more people to cut the “Plarn.” If you have bags, it would be very helpful if these were cut first. We can show you how.

The blankets from Blanket Day have been delivered to Mary’s Cradle and the Children’s Home Society. Six afghans were sent to Nursing Home Residents for Christmas via the UNW.

We continue to make baby hats for PRMC, BRMC, GRMC, and the Ronald McDonald House. We are also making purple newborn hats that will be shipped in April to the National Center on Shaken Baby Syndrome contact in Charleston.

Prayers shawls, quilts and more afghans are being created for a variety of needs for church members. 2018 will no doubt be another productive year for TLC.

We invite anyone and everyone to join us every Friday from 10-2 or the 2nd and 4th Thursdays from 5:30-7:30. We also accept items from people who prefer working from home.


