Not Quite Home

From the pastor...

⁴² The believers devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching, to the community, to their shared meals, and to their prayers. ⁴³ A sense of awe came over everyone. God performed many wonders and signs through the apostles. ⁴⁴ All the believers were united and shared everything. ⁴⁵ They would sell pieces of property and possessions and distribute the proceeds to everyone who needed them. ⁴⁶ Every day, they met together in the temple and ate in their homes. They shared food with gladness and simplicity. ⁴⁷ They praised God and demonstrated God's goodness to everyone. The Lord added daily to the community those who were being saved.

Acts 2:42-47 Common English Bible

During our Sunday worship about a year ago, we filled the sanctuary with 133 balloons to represent the changes in our attendance at FUMC since about 1990. At the time of the balloons, we were averaging 167 in worship. Around 1990, we were averaging close to 300.

A year later, our weekly average is 177. Not bad really. Especially if you take into account that during that same year we had 15 members go on to eternity.

By the time you read this I will have answered a question in our "Ask Almost Anything" series that deals with church growth and what that means. Because we are currently in a period of growth – yes, we are actually a growing church – I thought I would encourage you to continue the things that you are doing that are helping that growth. (If you heard my answer, these may sound familiar. They will also seem familiar if you have read *I Refuse to Serve a Dying Church*, which is the inspiration for them.)

Choosing Life Over Death – Trusting Jesus – As a congregation that creates environments where people can learn to trust Jesus, one of the most important things that we are doing each and every day is choosing life over death. Our lives, both in and away from the church building, proclaim that there is something more powerful at work in this world than all the troubles that we see. That something is life in Jesus and we choose it each day!

Being Involved in Grace Groups – Trusting Others – Another reason that our church has seen growth in the last year is because more and more people are becoming a part of some small group that helps them in the Christian life. I don't have hard numbers in front on me, but I am certain this is happening. Why? Because the church is growing. It fascinates me that despite the good that small groups or grace groups do for both the individual and the church, many people choose not to be a part of one. The main reason given is: I just don't have the time. My prayer over the next year will be that more and more of us commit as much time to small group participation as we do to some of the other important things in our lives.

Creating a fun place to be – Believeit or not, one of the hardest things for a church to do is become a fun place. We tend to be serious, because we realize that salvation is serious business. However, whenever we take ourselves too seriously, we lose focus of Jesus and tend to trust ourselves too much. This is why it is important for us to continue to be a "fun" place to be. If we laugh a



Being Bold about Our Calling to Provide Life to This Community – A few years ago, I picked up on some language that some of the members used in praying for our church – "church in the heart of Princeton" – and realized that this is part of our vision as a community of faith. It's easy to think that being the heart of the city means that we are the center of attention. However, that is not what the heart really does. The heart works. The heart works every single moment. The heart works every moment of every day to send out what is needed for the body to survive. The heart is one of the greatest "servant" organs that our bodies have.
